"And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. And awe came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. And all who believed were together and had all things in common.-Acts 2:42-44"

As promised in last month's newsletter, I am going to share from the passage above what is needed for church to take place. In August I wrote about what a church does not need to be a church. This list was not exhaustive by any means, but it did hit upon some things that appear to be of extreme importance in this consumeristic culture that we live in. We care more about what we can get out of a church rather than what we can give to a church through our time, talents, and gifts. So this month I am going to address the phrase: "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching." So let us dive right in to that discussion.

I do not believe it to be coincidental that the first thing that is mentioned is the importance of the Word of God which is what the "apostle's teaching" was and is. The reason I am not surprised is because all of the other three things that are needed to have a functioning church, you must have some foundation upon which to stand. That foundation is of course the foundation of the Word of God. You cannot fellowship rightly, observe the Lord's Table respectfully, or pray responsibly without the Word of God giving to you instruction. So, this is the lynch pin of all of the other three components of a church and therefore must be dealt with first.

To be a "New Testament Church" we must do the things and hold fast to the things that those in the "New Testament Church" did and held onto. They believed so much in the necessity and the power of the Word of God in their lives and in the life and health of the church that they "devoted themselves" to it. It was not a five minute foray into the Word; it was a consistent and conscientious study of the Word. The did not dip their toe into the kiddie pool of reading the scriptures, they dove into the deep end and allowed themselves to be swallowed up by the Word of God so that they might be changed and cleansed by it. They recognized that if they were to be "successful" in their walk as individuals and corporately, they must hear what God's word was telling them. They could not "lean upon their own understanding" and expect God to bless that endeavor.

I believe the 1st Century Christians believed and understood that the Word of God was their daily "manna." The only way that they could get through the day spiritually is that they had to have the nourishment of the Word. They did not want to starve. Just like the manna in the wilderness the true bread of the Word is within our reach and all we have to do is reach out our hands and gather it in. Unlike the manna in Moses' day, you can never take in too much. It never goes bad overnight and fills the home with a stench that lingers for days. Rather the more you bring into the home the better every nook and cranny of the home and the hearts of the residents are perfumed by the glory of the Word. Our conversations. thoughts and actions become more and more governed by the Word of God. Charles H. Spurgeon was a huge fan of John Bunyan the author of *Pilgrim's Progress*. He once said of Bunyan that if you cut him that he would bleed the Bible. What a wonderful testimony to have and what a wonderful example for which we should aspire to and emulate.

It is my desire that I as an individual and we corporately as a church would be known as people of the Word. That not only would we be well-versed in its content and meaning, but that our reputation would be that we live out the Word of God. It is one thing to know something and another to have that knowledge totally transform our behavior. This is the reason that I harp so much on the reading of the Word and its importance. It is the reason that we have been providing opportunities to get into the Scriptures more, through the *Celebrating the Sixty-Six* initiative. We have a new one for the fall that will be rolled out on September 8th.

The reason that the early church was so successfully in sharing the Gospel in the midst of persecution and difficulties, was due in large part to their knowledge of and living out the Word of God. Oh that we might follow in their footsteps, and dive into the depths of the Scriptures. May it cleanse and change us more into His image, giving to us the courage and comfort to live in this world as His ambassadors. May it be said of us at the end of our lives that if you cut him/her that they bled the Bible.


