

with purpose. So, much of what many churches and Christians call fellowship is rather shallow. We discuss the weather, our jobs, sports, our families, etc. Although there is nothing wrong with this in general, it is just that we rarely go deeper in the discussion. The reality is if you attempt to go deeper with someone, they almost always put up road blocks that read: "Road Closed Do Not Enter."

One of the reasons for this in my estimation is that people look at their faith in God as something personal and private; nothing could be further from the truth. We are to experience *koinonia* not only with God, but also with our brothers and sisters in Christ. If we only are intimate with God, we are losing out on the benefits of being intimate with the family of God and in so doing our intimacy with God is hindered. We have been made to be in community with one another for multiple reasons: growth, protection, correction, encouragement, help in all kinds of ways. When we are lacking in *koinonia* with one another our growth as a follower of the Most High is stunted and we never reach the maturity of the faith that the Apostles Paul and Peter speak of in their epistles. How sad it is when we see people not acting their age and being childish, how sadder still is the immaturity of so many Christians who have known Christ for decades.

So, why is true *koinonia* not a reality in most churches? First of all, sadly, ministers like myself have not properly taught on the subject and or been an example in it. Secondly, our sinful tendencies are to be loners and independent. Thirdly, we struggle with intimacy because we are always fearful and suspect of being hurt or having our trust betrayed. Finally, we know that we are not spending time in the Word which is the basis of this fellowship and we do not want to be exposed for our lack of personal depth. I am sure there are many more reasons, but these are enough to adequately make the point. How do we "fix" the problem? I have a few suggestions on how we can grow in *koinonia*.

The first thing we must do is to confess our sin of our lack of true *koinonia* to God, and then repent and become resolved to pursue *koinonia*. Secondly, we must ask God to help us overcome our human tendencies of fear and independence, we cannot do this alone. Thirdly, we must be in the Word daily as that is the basis of our growing in intimacy with our brothers and sisters. Fourthly, we need to practice going deeper with others. A good place to start is in the home. Ask your spouse, your children about their time in the Word, what they got out of the sermon, Sunday School or Wednesday night. Lastly, begin to grow your circle and ask people that you are close to at church the same questions. So, the next time you go out for coffee or a meal begin to go deeper with each other and experience the blessing of *koinonia*.
